Dear Immaculate Heart of Mary Family,

In the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit ... with these words every Catholic begins every prayer. Last Wednesday at Our Catholic Journey, David Pipp discussed the rich and mysterious meaning of these few simple words. How often do we stop and think about the impact of the words we use. How often do we really listen to what we say and what we mean by what we say. When we voice the words, we begin in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, we acknowledge God Himself! We say "**Hello.**" Have you ever noticed how much different it feels to have someone just say "Hi" as opposed to when they say "Hi Henry, or Sally, or even Mom." When we say a person's name we recognize them; we say something about what they mean to us and we acknowledge that we actually have a relationship with them. The same is true with God. When we say His name, "Father," we speak volumes about our relationship with Him. Like our own fathers, when we say "In the name of the Father" we admit we are His children. We also can surmise He loves us like a parent and that love is unconditional and non-judgmental. Sometimes this also might mean God the Father has to provide what our own fathers didn't and that we can look to Him for guidance, direction and even discipline. A name reveals the nature of a person and thus the same can be said about God. Therefore, when we pray its so important to pay attention to the names we attribute to God in the Holy Trinity. It's a wonderful sign of the richness of our faith that we address the Trinity every time we begin our prayer. I certainly hope you all continue to join us on Wednesday evenings to engage in the wonderful discussion we provide for all of you about the beautiful liturgy we celebrate every weekend.

At these liturgies, "the work of the people," we also bring our entire lives to God to show Him our praise and honor. If our lives are rich and meaningful it becomes so essential that we give a portion of that life back to God who made it possible. Thus, I am convinced it is truly anti-life not to acknowledge God, to pray and to give Him the glory. Life is a gift to each of us and when we do not love the gift, we do not love the giver. Thus, if we love life we must naturally love the Creator and Author of that life. Unless, of course, we are typical victims of the mentality of modern society, which truly believes we are the creator of our own lives! We aren't. In the long run we certainly are responsible for what we do with the life we are given; however, that is starkly different then believing we created our own life. Even if a person was stupid enough not to believe in God, they must admit they didn't create their own life. Their parents did. Or, a test tube did or something did, but not the individual. On an even different level I would like to see a parent, doctor, scientist, or any other person create life! With all its intricacies, all its mystery, all its complications ... **our lives are amazing!** And, the Creator of that life has to be even more amazing! Therefore, it makes sense that if we love life, we must naturally turn in gratitude to the one who is the Master of that life!

In the coming weeks we will begin to introduce a wonderful new advisory board at Immaculate Heart of Mary. After almost two years in process and prayer we are proud to welcome our very first **Life Council**. This council of six people, chosen as volunteers from among our parishioners, will have the responsibility of advising me, the pastor, on ways we can uphold the dignity of life from the womb to the tomb and fight the culture of death which works tirelessly against that dignity. This advisory board will continually find ways to communicate to the parish community about ways you and I can work together to build a culture of life. If we are a community that will bring our entire lives to God every Sunday, then we must also be a community that celebrates life at every level. I am grateful to these fine volunteers for their willingness to work on these profound efforts. I look forward to introducing the Life Council in the coming weeks.

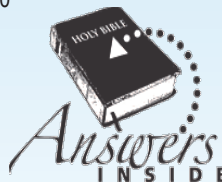

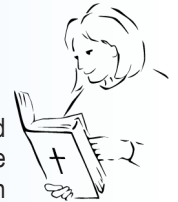


The Story and You

Sacred Conversations

27th Sunday of Ordinary Time

There's an incendiary sentence in this week's second reading from 1Timothy: "I remind you to stir into flame the gift of God bestowed when my hands were laid on you." Those of us in Colorado and California have had more than enough "flames" this season. One hundred and sixty-nine Boulder families were recently displaced when flames, whipped up by winds, darted from house to house, destroying homes and hundreds of acres of land. It is the most costly fire in Colorado history.



But it does give one pause. How quickly, how ravenously a fire can consume anything in its wake. A fire starts out quietly (in this case in a barbecue pit) and then builds volume as it spreads. And it's just that kind of fire that the author of the letter to Timothy is encouraging!

I've seen lots of those kinds of fires. Twelve years ago my brother Marty pointed out a little girl in his inner-city math class and said, "This kid will be president someday if somebody will just give her a little help." Last year, at age 18 and a first-year college student, she wowed the benefactors at the Seeds of Hope Gala with her poised and thoughtful reflection on the many mentors who supported her as she navigated her way through elementary school and high school. She'll probably be president of her own non-profit someday. She will undoubtedly spend her life stoking the same fires of compassion and justice that were darting around her during those difficult years.

Send forth the fires of your justice, God. And let each one of us fan the flames of radical kindness and goodness into a fire that can never be extinguished.

Can you remember a kindness that one person extended that grew into a larger "firestorm" of good?

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

CHOICES WE MAKE

Adult: *What choices do I make daily that affect my eternal life?*

Child: *How can I show more love to my neighbor?*

Although Christ was speaking to the Apostles, His words apply to all of us, each in his own station in life. Following the example of the Apostles, we must all pray for greater trust in God. Most of us are inclined to forget God and his providence when our earthly affairs are going well. How often do we thank Him when we are enjoying good health, and when our home-life and business are going smoothly? How many of us Catholics make sincere prayers of thanksgiving for all the gifts we have received and are receiving daily from God's providence. How many rather pat ourselves on the back for what we claim as our own successes? It is only when a storm arises in our lives that we think of Him. Remember that storm on the Lake of Gennesaret. The Apostles were rowing cheerfully across the lake. They were probably telling tall tales about the size and the number of fish they had caught there in their day. They may have been striving against one another to show who was the strongest oarsman. They did not seem to notice that Jesus was sleeping soundly in the bow of the boat. They thought of Him only when the storm arose, and then when they realized that they were in danger they shouted to Him for help (Mk. 5: 37). They didn't realize that both the calm and the storm were under His province.

Too many of us forget God and fail to give Him the thanks and the credit for our well-being which we owe him. We rush to Him only when trouble strikes. In His infinite goodness He often answers such panic prayers. If, however, we had thought of Him every day and realized His place in our lives with how



much more confidence would we then approach Him in our hour of special need? If our own personal lives were stronger, how much more readily would we accept the adversities and the trials that He sends us or allows to befall us for our eternal good? We can all ask God today to "increase our faith."

As regards to our work for God's kingdom and for the salvation of ourselves and of our neighbor we are, like the Apostles, servants of God, and we should be proud of our status. We should be glad, that is, that He allows us to cooperate with Him in the building of His heavenly kingdom. Are we really dutiful servants in this regard? Let us ask ourselves seriously today: what have I done up to now to help to make God known to my neighbor who is ignorant of God and never thinks of what will happen to him after death? I may not be able to put in words very clearly what I know and believe about God and the future life, but I can speak to Him far more convincingly by my way of living and by my daily actions.

The sincere Christian can find many ways to help make Christ known to his neighbor without going on the foreign missions. We all have friends and family that are non-believers, often such through no fault of their own, and there are many lax Catholics all around us. We should, and we can, have an effective influence on them and on their eternal future, if we ourselves live our Christian lives as Christ expects us to do. A quiet word, a charitable gesture, a truly unselfish interest in a neighbor's troubles, coming from a sincere layman can do more good than a series of sermons given by a renowned theologian in the parish church.

Look around you today. Think of your fellow-workers and those living on your own street. Many of them need help and need it badly. You can help them, God expects you to help them. It is His plan for getting you to help yourself to get to Heaven.
